12. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year(maximum five bullets)

- An Orientation Programme was organized by the IQAC Cell for freshers on 6.7. 2017. The programme was conducted to welcome freshers and orient them to the rules in academics, the avenues available in cocurricular activities, and the code of conduct with regard to discipline and behaviour expected from students. Components of the orientation programme included an elaborate presentation by Controller of Examinations Dr. S. Meena on the rules and regulations governing academics and a motivational talk by Psychologist, Dr. S. Nappinnai.
- In association with the Indira Gandhi Open University the IQAC cell organized a seminar on Introduction to Value Added Courses for final year UG and PG courses,

which was attended by over 1000 students. Dr. Dorothy Regional Director and Hassan Deputy Director made a detailed presentation on the courses available to students and staff respectively. • The feedback forms submitted by all the Depts for the year 201617 were statistically analysed under the aegis of the IQAC Cell and presented to the Depts for their examination and further action. • The format for Lesson Plan was designed in accordance to the latest norms and circulated by the IQAC cell to the teaching staff of all the Departments. Further, inclusion of Course Outcome and Programme Outcome in the syllabus revision of all Departments was insisted. • A two day NAAC Sponsored workshop on Curriculum Design and Development for Quality in Higher Education was conducted by the IQAC Cell on 5th and 6th January 2018. The key areas covered in the workshop were Designing a Curriculum, Outcome based education, Instructional model for e learning, Enhancing quality in teaching, Enhancing quality in evaluation and research education. Delegates who attended the workshop included 94 Asst/Assoc Professors and 8 research scholars from colleges across the country with 12 participants from colleges outside the state,14 from outside the city and 76 from colleges within the city.

The entire admission process in the college is decentralized as the flow of authority is in the order of Principal, Admission Committee, Coordinators, Department Admission Staff, Selection Committee, PROs. The Principal is the highest authority who sanctions admission based on the approval of the Admission Committee who verify all the documents of the student against the originals, check with the sanctioned strength and quota allotment in each course. The student approaches the admission committee only after thorough screening for eligibility and verification of documents by the admission staff of the respective departments, who in turn seek the approval of an admission coordinator who is usually a senior faculty from other departments. Access to the admission staff in each department is gained by the student seeking admission only after the selection committee (a set of senior faculty) select the candidate to a particular course based on eligibility, sanctioned strength, quota allotment and cutoff marks. The students are guided to the selection committee by junior staff who are deputed as PROs on the day of admission. All events of the college such as Union Inauguration, Valediction, College Day, Cultural Sports day and Convocation, are conducted by the coordinated effort of all the departments in college. Each department is assigned a particular duty which include preparation of the invite, arrangements for high tea, reception, rangoli, hall and seating arrangement, stage decoration distribution of prizes, etc., which contribute to the smooth execution of these activities in college on a regular basis.

Further scholarships are awarded to all students from the BC, MBC, SC and ST community throughout their period of study, for which purpose students are made to open a bank account and the scholarship is directly credited into their account. The institution offers wide scope for comprehensive and complete higher education as students opting to study in this institution have 24 degree programs to choose from, with 20 departments offering postgraduate programs and 10 departments offering Ph.D programs.
